2009 in Review

- Participated in the China Glass 2009 exhibition at Shanghai New international Expo Center
- •Introduced new types of screen printing such as faded printing with a maximum print area of 600mm x 1000mm.

- •Start of a new float line in Wuhan which brings the total number of float lines owned and operated by Intex Glass at six.

- Addition of two new IG production lines with argon-filling capability in October.
